Brian Bannasch, Coach, Rogers City High School

Brian Bannasch, conference coordinator for the Northern Michigan Bowling Conference since its formation in 1997, has served terms with the Michigan State YABA and MHSAA advisory committee as well as Vice President of MHSIBCA. He is currently the chairman of the youth committee for the Bowling Centers Association of Michigan. Brian guided Rogers City, the smallest school in the field, to the first state high school bowling championship in 1999. Since establishing the varsity bowling programs in Rogers City, the boys and girls teams have accumulated 12 conference titles, six regional titles, numerous appearances at the state finals, including a runner up finish for the boys in 2004, and a large number of individual participation at the state finals. Brian feels the greatest thrill in coaching is the experience given to each athlete. It is something they will remember for the rest of their lives. This is an honor that would not have been possible without the understanding and support of his wife of seventeen years Barb, along with their two daughters Tayler and Rebecca.

Paul Bentley, Coach, Hudsonville High School

Paul Bentley, Head Coach for Hudsonville Bowling, has guided the program for the last eleven years. Paul coached the boy's and girl's teams for eight years, and has been only the boy's coach for the last three. His teams have achieved 11 conference, nine district, and five regional championships. Rick Dodick, Proprietor, Monitor Lanes

Rick Dodick, proprietor of Monitor Lanes in Bay City, has been actively involved in high school bowling since its origin with the Bowling Centers Association of Michigan. From its first season in 1998, Rick was instrumental in the formation of the Tri City High School Conference acting as its sole Commissioner from the very beginning to the present time. Starting in 2005, Rick helped form the Tri City JV High School Conference, serving as its Commissioner and bringing together JV Teams from 3 different bowling conferences. In 2006, as the Saginaw Valley Conference was formed, Rick was elected as its Commissioner, a position he still holds today. Monitor Lanes is a proud sponsor and host of Bay City Western and Bangor John Glenn High School Bowling Teams. Monitor Lanes has hosted a MHSAA Division II Regional for the past five seasons and have sponsored two major high school holiday tournaments for the last five years, the Bangor John Glenn Holiday Invitational and the Bay City Western Baker's Dozen. Rick has coached the Bay City Western Lady Warriors since 1998 leading them to 3 top 5 finishes in the Bowling Centers Association State Team Finals in 1998, 1999, and 2001. In the 2007-2008 season. Rick coached the Lady Warriors to an undefeated conference season and was voted "Coach of the Year" in the Saginaw Valley Conference. Jerome Doyle, Proprietor, Colonial Lanes

Jerome (Jerry) Doyle, proprietor of Colonial Lanes in Flushing, MI, has been influential in the progress of high school bowling in Michigan. Flint was one of the first areas of the state to start a high school bowling program when Jerry, along with other members of the Flint Metro Bowling Proprietors Association. was introduced to the idea by Ron Tomassoni and Scott Bennett. The conference started with 7 teams. Since that time, the conference has grown to 80 teams. Jerry financially supports the program and sponsors 16 teams out of his center. Colonial Lanes. For the past two years, he has become even more involved with the program as the head coach for the Flushing Junior Varsity teams. Jerry has been married for 58 years to his wife Betty and together they had 10 children. Last year he was inducted into the Flint Men's Bowling Association Hall of Fame, and he has been involved with bowling since he was a pinsetter in the late 1940s. Jerry currently bowls on three leagues, including the Thursday Night Keglers which he has been a member of since 1965. As a proprietor, Jerry believes that this sport is a great chance for all youth to get involved in a most fulfilling activity for the rest of their lives.
